EXCERPT FROM "FIRST PRESIDENT SPEAKS"


Interview with His Excellency Sir Ellis Clarke TC, the first President of the Republic of Trinidad and Tobago (1976)

Q: (What are) the significant differences between your being President of this new Republic and your previous position as Governor-General?

His Excellency Sir Ellis Clarke: Well first of all, before I answer your question strictly, let me say that I am grateful for this opportunity of perhaps clarifying a situation that is not as simple as one might assume it to be. I therefore welcome the chance to say that the major change is that the President of Trinidad and Tobago is the Head of State of the country. The Governor General was the representative of a foreign Head of State. The Queen of England was Queen of Trinidad and Tobago and other countries and the Governor-General of Trinidad and Tobago, although often referred to as the Head of State, was really the representative of Her Majesty. Now Trinidad and Tobago has its own Head of State. I think this is important, it is a matter of substance. It is also a matter that is symbolical of the - shall I call it - "adulthood" of the nation. We have grown up. We now have our own Head of State. In addition, the President has certain powers and duties that the Governor-General did not have. While the President is not an Executive President, he does have a number of duties, particularly in the field of making appointments and many of these are key appointments so that there is some dilution of the power formerly possessed by the Prime Minister and a transfer of a certain portion of the Prime Minister's power to the President.

Q: You have stated what the presidency means to you. I am sure our citizens would like to hear your views on what the new Republic of Trinidad and Tobago should mean to them.

His Excellency Sir Ellis Clarke: Well, I think the Republic of Trinidad and Tobago should mean to them a country which they love, a country which they are prepared to serve. I think that hither to we have been lacking in a vital quality and that is patriotism. I should hope that this change to a Republic will enable us to think of ourselves as one people and to think of our country as a place to which we are absolutely devoted and dedicated. If our people can get this from being a Republic, then I think the change is more than justified.

WHAT IS THE GOVERNMENT'S HOUSING POLICY?

The Government of Trinidad and Tobago under the leadership of Prime Minister Dr the Honourable Keith Rowley is working assiduously on its housing policy.

The three pillars of the policy are:

- 1. Affordability; building quality homes at a cost which would be affordable for low to middle income earners through affordable mortgages, Rent to Own and Licence to Occupy programmes
- 2. Accessibility; constructing homes in high demand areas and at affordable costs
- 3. Improvement in the quality of living; through the provision of security of tenure to squatters as well as grants for home improvement and community upgrades

Currently, the Housing Development Corporation (HDC) has over 160,000 applications for housing. The need for housing is spread across the length and breadth of the country. However, the geographic area that registers the greatest need for affordable housing units is undoubtedly the East/West Corridor.

The HDC has now implemented a new system whereby, at various stages of construction, units are inspected to minimise and/or effectively treat with defects before the stage of completion. Therefore, once the unit is completed, it can be distributed without unnecessary delays for repairs and refurbishment. Potential homeowners are better assured of receiving the keys to a quality home.

Over the period 2016 to 2018 Government will embark on an extensive housing construction programme to help satisfy the demand for housing across the country. To date, two sod turning ceremonies have been held in the East/West Corridor which will yield some 200 units. These units will cost between \$400,000 and \$550,000. Prime Minister Rowley was on hand recently to turn the sod at the River Runs Through By-Pass Road, Arima.

In technical speak, the Office of the Prime Minister (Tobago Affairs) – Central Administrative Services Tobago (OPM-CAST) has as its responsibility the co-ordination of matters related to Tobago, according to the Sixth Schedule of the Tobago House of Assembly (THA) Act. Simply put, the matters for which the Assembly shall not **be** responsible such as;

- The President
- National Security
- Foreign Affairs
- Civil Aviation
- Meteorology
- Immigration
- Legal Affairs including the registration of documents
- The Judiciary
- Auditor General
- Ombudsman
- Service Commissions

Acting Permanent Secretary Mrs Bernadette Solomon-Koroma heads a staff of approximately 132 officers, organized across some 14 units, which include finance and accounting; legal; internal audit; registrar general; meteorological services; communications; information and communication technology; planning and monitoring; prices, weights and measures and human resources.

CAST SUCCESSES

OPM-CAST, to the credit of its staff, boasts several successful initiatives.

In August of this year, a vacation and afterschool programme was conducted at its premises at Orange Hill Road, Scarborough. Employees' children aged between 3-15 years participated in a programme of activities developed in keeping with the Government's policies for child education and development.

FOCUS ON GOOD HEALTH

A state of the art gym - which is accessible to elite athletes from the Division of Youth Affairs and Sport, as well as Central Government Staff, Tobago and staff of CAST- was opened in February 2016. In keeping with Government's call for citizens to adopt healthier lifestyles, the gym offers staff an opportunity for improved functioning of body, mind and spirit through supervision by qualified instructors.

It will offer increased and improved meteorological services and will operate as an alternative provider of all essential meteorological services in the event that the Meteorological Services Division, Trinidad office, is unable to function in the wake of a natural disaster or other emergency.

Celebrates 54 years of Independence!

Message to the Nation by Dr. the Honourable Keith Rowley, MP, Prime Minister of the Republic of Trinidad & Tobago on the occasion of Trinidad and Tobago's 54th Anniversary of Independence

My fellow citizens,

By any measure, today should be regarded as a very significant and special day for each of us in Trinidad and Tobago.

Over the past few months, since assuming the responsibility of Prime Minister, you would have heard me speak about the importance of knowing and understanding our country's history.

Trinidad and Tobago's passage from Colonial rule to Independence, fifty-four (54) years ago, represented a political watershed in our country's history. While not wholly embraced by some members of the population, who initially expressed misgivings

about the idea that Trinidadians and Tobagonians would be in complete charge of the affairs of the country, there was nonetheless an excitement and a sense of pride when the Union Jack was lowered for the last time at midnight on the 30th August 1962 and the national flag of Trinidad and Tobago was raised.

I am certain if we could transpose ourselves back to that momentous occasion we too would feel all those mixed emotions.

On 31st August 1962, our Nation's first Prime Minister, Dr Eric Williams, in a radio broadcast to a new, democratic Nation stated, "The first responsibility that devolves upon you is the protection and promotion of your democracy. Democracy means more, much more, than the right to vote and one vote for every man and every woman of the prescribed age. Democracy means recognition of the rights of others... Democracy means responsibility of the Government to its citizens, the protection of the citizens from the exercise of arbitrary power and the violation of human freedoms and individual rights. Democracy means freedom of worship for all and the subordination of the right of any race to the overriding right of the human race".

Fifty-four years later we must ask ourselves, how have we used our independence? Yes we may be considered an economically buoyant and a politically stable country. We generally enjoy excellent bilateral relations with our CARICOM, Latin American and International neighbours and partners.

But have we really matured as a people?

As individuals, on our journey to adulthood we often crave independence. We wish to free ourselves from the dictates of parents, guardians, supervisors. But as we mature we realize that with independence comes great responsibility, hope and expectation.









We are responsible for our actions, the consequences of our decisions and more importantly, to achieve our goals we need to work with and through others. So too as a sovereign nation, independence demands a clear vision for our developmental path while remaining cognizant of local, regional and international trends.

The celebration of our country's 54th Independence Anniversary comes at a challenging time when international developments are seriously impacting our national economy. We are all aware of the fall in oil and gas prices, the resources upon which our country is heavily dependent for needed revenue.

We find ourselves at a crucial point in our development when we are being asked to make some tough choices. But I always feel assured of the strength of our people to navigate these turbulent waters. Our capacity for innovation, our understanding of international events, our creativity and our characteristic sense of humour will triumph over any adversity we may face. I have faith in our ability to rise to the task of building a better Trinidad and Tobago.

Our aim now, both as residents and non-resident nationals, should be to build on our achievements to enable our country to remain on a steady path of sustainable development. We have a great deal of challenging work ahead of us but nothing

worth achieving may be attained without dedication and hard work.

We have a very bright future ahead of us. Of this I am certain. We will tackle our challenges head on, together. We have to take care of every aspect of this country...our political and democratic institutions, our physical environment, and most of all we have to take care of each other.

Trinidad and Tobago is my home, it is your home and we all have a responsibility to protect, to cherish and to make this country the kind of home of which we can all be proud.

I wish you all a very Happy Independence.

May God continue to bless you and your family and may God Bless our Nation.

Prime Minister Dr. Rowley continues to hold regular meetings of the National Security Council (NSC), of which he is Chairman. The Council is charged with the responsibility of monitoring matters relating to defence and national security. The Attorney General, the Minister of National Security, the Minister of Foreign and CAR-ICOM Affairs and senior members of the Protective Services are also co-opted to attend meetings of the NSC.

More recently, the Prime Minister announced that he takes the responsibility for how community policing is implemented personally, as national security continues to be one of the Government's top priorities.

Graduation Ceremony: transforming our nation citizen by citizen

On Sunday 21st August, 2016, the Office of the Prime Minister (Gender and Child Affairs) celebrated the graduation of three hundred and eight (308) men and women from the Women in Harmony, Defining Masculine Excellence and Home Management and Food Preparation for Men and Boys Programmes. Participants arrived elegantly dressed and ready to receive their certificates to mark the completion of their programme. They all felt a sense of pride and joy that all their hard work had paid off, and they were able to make another step in their personal development.

There were fifty-five (55) graduates of the **Women in Harmony Programme** with training in Agriculture/ Landscaping and Elderly Care. The programme was designed to address the problems of unemployment among women. The programme targets women who are twenty-six (26) to forty-five (45) years old and who are mostly single heads of households with low or no skills and low or no income.

The **Defining Masculine Excellence Programme** completed its six week course with ninety three (93) participants. The programme featured more than ten (10) modules designed specifically to stem the tide of problems associated with misconnects and perceptions of masculinity and catered to males aged fourteen years (14) and older.

The Home Management and Food Preparation for Men and Boys aims to provide males from aged nine (9) and up with culinary skills and fine dining techniques so that they can better contribute to the development of healthy families and improved social relations within their homes and communities.


DID YOU KNOW?
